Trust – it's just a five-letter word, but if it is broken, it can have severe consequences.

We just dropped off our kitty, Molly, to the Vet to have her teeth cleaned. It sounds like an easy procedure, but they put them to sleep and if a tooth is too far gone, they will extract it. Many years ago, we brought our cat C.K. to the Vet. They extracted several teeth, and he was so miserable. Then about a month later he passed away. Was his death due to the teeth removal, we don't know, but the incident broke our hearts and our trust. And even though he was 13 years old at the time, and Molly is just 9 years old, both Chuck and I found ourselves dreading dropping her off because we were fearful of the outcome. That's the problem with broken trust – it is hard to rebuild.

Throughout our lives we have to put our trust in so many people. When we get married, we have to place our trust in our spouse, believing that they will always be faithful to us. We've all seen the damage that breaking that trust can do, not just to the couple but their families.

When we fall ill, we place our trusts in the doctors and nurses to heal us. Most of the time that trust is rewarded with successful surgeries or recoveries. But sometimes things go wrong, and trust is broken. In every facet of our lives trust is a factor. From banking to your children's teacher, to our church leadership, to government, to our friendships, we need to believe that they are honest and truthful in their dealings with us and that they will never harm us.

The problem is those are all people and humans are fallible. Inevitably, they will sometimes make mistakes. When I was working as a personnel manager and something slipped through the cracks, I was so grateful that we could always fix it. That isn't always possible in other fields like medicine.

Ultimately, there is only ONE who you know will never break your trust, and that is Jesus. No matter what you are going through He will be with you throughout it all. Does that mean everything will work out perfectly if you trust in him – No. But He never promised that; in fact, He said, "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." But we can trust - that He will never leave us nor forsake us and that He will be with us throughout each day of our lives.
