Time flies, to be sure. I feel this more and more the older I get. A quick recap in case you hadn't read my last article in the Messenger. On the way to the airport for our cruise to the Panama Canal we had some serious issues arise. First, I forgot an important prescription at home, but fortunately the pharmacy was able to override the system and get a new prescription for me. The next obstacle was that on the way to board the ship a Carnival Representative (CR) informed us that our passport was less than six months from expiring and therefore we could not board the ship. They told us to take a seat while they made calls that would decide our fate. Now for the rest of the story (like Paul Harvey would say).

So, as we're sitting there waiting and praying to be able to board the ship two other women came up to us. The same thing had happened to them. I told them that our son was the Cruise Director, and they were making calls to see what they could do. I texted my son to let him know what was going on. He couldn't believe it and hadn't ever heard about this rule. He said, "I'll make some calls, Mom." But I told him that the CR was just then calling us back and I would let him know what she said. As we walked back up to the counter, the CR said, "Congratulations, welcome on Board!" Thank you, Lord!

As we were boarding the ship, the two ladies came up and hugged me, telling me, "They let us on, too!" They were ecstatic. I think it was a blessing that our son Paul was the Cruise Director because it allowed all four of us to board the ship. The final incident was that I lost my mother's ring. It's very special to me because it has both my Dad's wedding ring and my mom's soldered together. So, when I found out it was missing, I was devastated. I went to Guest Services and reported that it was missing and I described my ring. I checked in the next day, and the next but nothing had been returned. Facing the reality of the situation I realized that on a huge cruise ship like this with over 2000 passengers it was probably gone forever. But three days later, I received an amazing call. An anonymous person had returned my ring. Hallelujah!

Was it just coincidental that these three events happened to me. No, I think God was sharing important lessons for me that I could share with you. No matter how bleak things may seem, there is always hope. In all three instances, I had no power to solve the problems myself, all I could do was pray. There are going to be times in our lives that do look bleak, where we have no real power to change things. In those times, when it feels like life is stacked against us, we have to remember to always put our trust in God. And remember that if there is nothing we can do to change a bad situation – we can still pray and those prayers are powerful.
